We are excited to welcome you and your students to the exhibition: Unsung Heroes of Public Health! This educator guide includes the exhibition description as well as pre and post-visit prompts to help your students prepare for and reflect on the exhibition. They may be taught as a classroom discussion, writing exercise or research project.

Exhibition Description

"Unsung Heroes of Public Health" aims to reframe and widen the historical narrative of public health, by spotlighting individuals and organizations that have made significant contributions to public health milestones in New York City. For a city of 8 million, public health requires a multitude of approaches working together – community activism, research & innovation, information sharing and mentorship. These are stories of perseverance and dedication to shaping a healthier future for those to come.



Choose one or both of the prompts for your students to respond to. Discuss these responses as a class or in small groups to come up with a working definition of 'public health.' This discussion will prepare your students with a basic understanding of the concept of public health, which the exhibition will expand and clarify with historic and contemporary examples.

- During the COVID-19 pandemic, who did you see helping the health of our communities?
- What were highly visible roles (i.e. front-line hospital staff)?
- What are behind-the-scenes roles (i.e. workers processing test samples)?

Defining public health:

- What do you need to be healthy?
- What does your family need to be healthy?
- What does your school need to be healthy?
- What does your community need to be healthy?

As a city of 8 million people, New York City requires many organizations and a multitude of approaches to public health. Read through the stories in the exhibition and fill in the blanks.

PROMPT#1

- Refer to questions 4 & 5 on your 'Do Now' exhibition activity (person who impacted your community, most memorable public health hero).
- Write a one paragraph bio introducing this person to your classmates.
- Why did this person stand out to you?
- How did they impact the field of public health? You may do further research on this individual.

Interview Questions:

- Refer to questions 2 on your 'Do Now' exhibition activity.
- Why did this quote stand out to you?
- What did it reveal about the public health hero and their work?
- If you were able to meet and continue the conversation with this person, what are 3 more questions you would ask them.
